Forestry Summer School

CMO's Summer School

<u>CMO</u> of South Africa organizes an annual forestry engineering course for young professionals to expose them to different aspects of forest engineering. KVTC allowed me to attend the course which was an exciting opportunity

Venue of the course was George in the W-Cape of South Africa. Part of the course was classroom based and machine simulation training, but the bulk took place in field at different forestry companies (MTO and PG Bison), equipment manufacturers (Husqvarna, Bell, Mercedes Benz) and forestry contractors.

Course Modules

The following are some of the key topics covered in the course

- Planning of harvestings operations and managing high risks which has impacts on SPEQS (Safety, Productivity, Environment, Quality and Social), strategic, tactical, annual and compartment planning.
- Selection of harvesting systems at exposure using the SPEQS criteria and costings.

- 3. Costing of harvesting systems, machines and productivity assessments.
- Selection of harvesting equipment and machines, timber transport and logistics, maintenance and servicing.
- 5. Forest roads maintenance, financial and environmental impacts on forest roads management.

Reflection

The experience has changed my approach the daily work and I gained exposure on the aspects of forestry engineering, harvesting, haulage, forest roads management and financial implications of each.

The course also exposed me to, non-work and new environments like tourism areas around George and Knysna, shopping malls, beaches and even a visit to the oldest and biggest tree in RSA ± 800 years old *Podocarpus falcatus* in Outeniqua.

OSP PURCHASES 2018

In 2017 KVTC started purchasing logs from Outgrowers and the second half of 2018 we saw a significant increase. This year we bought close to 1,000m3 from external growers creating revenues in excess of TZS 250m for farmers, contractors and authorities. We hope to increase our volumes in 2019

Illegal Logging and Encroachment

A worrying trend

KVTC manages approximately 20,000ha of conservation land consisting of Miombo woodlands (16,000ha) and grass- and wetlands (4,000ha).

The success of KVTC's conservation efforts can be clearly seen on Google Earth where KVTC's forest areas stick out and whilst deforestation in the surrounding areas has reached alarming levels KVTC's forests are relatively intact.

The downside of this success is that we see increasing levels of illegal logging both in our teak plantations as well as the natural forests.

Aside of illegal logging we are experiencing increasing levels of encroachment by pastoralists into our teak plantations causing significant damage to, in particular, the young plantings.

The Impact

KVTC prides itself of the quality of the woodlands we manage and we can see a clear positive impact in terms of rainfall and water quality across our estates. The conservation of the woodlands creates a mini-climate that makes our teak trees thrive. Without our natural forests and without young plantings our business will see diminished growth resulting in loss of employment and revenues, including taxes.

Urgent Call for Support

Through this note in our newsletter we like to bring the urgency of the situation to the attention of the authorities and our stakeholders and call on their support to curb the current trend and ensure that KVTC's conservation areas and plantations are safe from illegal activities.

KVTC employs approximately 30 game scouts across its property however the shear scale of incursion is such that without support of the authorities (Tanzania Forest Service, Wildlife Management Authorities, District Authorities) we are not able to control the situation.
